Sully District Council Minutes of the Council Meeting June 22, 2005

President Mark McConn called the meeting to order at 7:35 p.m. at the Sully District Government Building. In attendance were Members Mark McConn and Judith Heisinger, Bull Run Civic Association; Jay Johnston, Virginia Run; John Swanson, Franklin Farm; Jeff Parnes, Chantilly Highlands; Jim Neighbors, Sully Station; and Carol Hawn, Old Mill.

- o Gang Prevention
 - Low crime rate in the US
 - Gangs are on the horizon
 - MS-13 violence
 - 10 homicides last year only gang-related
 - Gang Task Force formed
 - Gang Coordinator hired
 - Middle-school focused
 - Dual-job families with children at home alone after school
 - Teen centers in focused areas
 - Gang hot lines for parents and others
 - Mobile training team for community education
 - Indicators for gangs
 - Balance between enforcement and prevention
- o Affordable Housing
 - Focused on new development but very expensive
 - Losing affordable housing units (hundreds of units each time)
 - Task force with 18 recommendations
 - Use existing taxes to have a pool of money for affordable housing
 - Save 1,000 existing units in four years and saved 500 units in the last 18 months
 - 78% of the police live outside the county
 - PA, DE, WV
- o Environment
 - 20 year plan
 - Water and air quality
 - Cheapeake Water Shed standards are higher
 - One penny for the existing tax for stormwater management
 - Higher rates of asthma
 - Most air pollution is from transportation
 - Bus fleet is converting to low-emission

- 8 park holdings added to the FC (one holding is NYC Central Park)
 - 15% of the county land mass in Park Authority
- Lorton Prison property; 300 buildings; golf course in Fall 2005
- Land stewardship is very important
- WO&D trail has changed
- County Trail is 38 miles with multiple connections to existing regional trail system; cross-streets for pick-up/drop-off
- o High Education Standards
 - Key to the quality of life
 - Top ten school system
 - Generates jobs, low crime rates, and good housing
 - Newsweek survey; all high schools made the list
 - Test scores are higher
 - Diversity with 50% white causians
 - Lowest drop-out rate
 - Over 100 languages
 - TJ High School is top US school
- Transportation
 - Transportation did not keep with up changing patterns
 - Four-year plan
 - Not going to solve traffic congestion
 - People need choices in FC
 - Dulles Rail System
 - Transit in Richmond Highway
 - 18,000 defense workers going to Fort Belvoir
 - Tele-commuting can make a big difference
 - 20% of the FC govt workers by end of year
 - Encourage industry
 - 1.6% employment rate
 - HOT lanes on the Washington Beltway; HOV is free; single drivers pay tolls; ramps for bus movement; emergency lanes
 - \$50 million for transportation funding
- o Tax Diversity
 - State controls most taxes
 - Real estate is only tax available
 - Dealing with economic ups and downs
 - 60% of the operating budgets based on the property tax
 - Largest real estate tax rate cut in the FC history
 - All tax revenues are up
 - The three big consumers are schools, safety, and infrastructure
 - Three new tax revenues (hotel,) with \$35 million per year
- Driver Education
 - 24% of traffic accidents were teenagers
 - Complex driving conditions in the FC with proper judgment capability in the FC
- Tri-County Parkway
 - Three alternatives

- One alternative in the FC and in the comprehensive plan
- Boards of Supervisors has not made a decision
- More expensive (hundreds of \$100 million)
- Water quality issues
- Traffic volume studies
- Environmental Impact Studies
- VDOT will probably make a decision by end of year
- Richmond Issues
 - Fair shares of funding
 - FC Chairman is the President of Virginia Counties
 - Some state senators and delegates are hostile to FC
 - Dealing with problematic issues
 - Coalition building
 - Several of the past state governors were hostile to Northern Virginia
 - FC generates about 26% of the state tax revenue
 - 42% of the state tax revenue is from Northern Virginia
 - 25% of the FC population is foreign-born; ESL
 - State school funding is based on income; 48% of Prince William and 20% of FC
- o Loudoun County growth is increasing
 - Pro-growth vs anti-growth boards creates instability
 - Fast-growing county in the US
 - Not creating jobs with the population growth
 - All extra funding goes to the school system
- o State University and Colleges
 - Will not take away the quota system from Northern Virginia school systems
- o I-66
 - Possible HOT lanes
 - Metro rail
 - No special tax district
 - Widening I-66
 - Multi-mode studies for the last ten years
 - Local advisory council with studies
 - VDOT is required to study all options and scare the local citizens; engineering vs. political environments
